## SPECIAL PROGRAMMES UNIT STRATEGY

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW

The strategy is a guide for the Mbhashe Municipality in its response to addressing the needs of children, youth, women, and older persons, people with disabilities and HIV and AIDS. In this strategy, children, youth, women, older persons and people with disabilities are referred to as vulnerable groups. The functions of the Sport have also been assigned to this Unit for coordination. The strategy builds on the lessons of our past achievements and failures and it serve as a blue print for all the stakeholders in Mbhashe Municipality. The strategy is aligned to the broader developmental plans of the municipality as outlined in its Integrated Development Plan (IDP).

#### 2. VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

#### Vision

"By 2025, Mbhashe Local Municipality will excel in service delivery to earn a reputation of being a place of choice for living, business and pleasure".

#### Mission

We will strive to become an effective and efficient municipality able to manage her resources and stimulate economic growth sustainably, promote a safe and healthy environment for the betterment of all with a bias towards the poor.

#### **Values**

In addition to the Batho Pele principles, our municipality commits itself to upholding the following set of values:

- Commitment
- Accountability
- Teamwork
- People Centred Development
- Discipline and respect

#### 3. LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY FRAMEWORK

Though there are several legislative and policy framework that regulates the mainstreaming of vulnerable groups, however, scope will be limited to the following:-

#### THE CONSTITUTION OF THE REPUBLIC OF SA, 1996 (ACT. 108 OF 1996)

Section 9 of the constitution advances equality of everyone before the law (see Chapter 2: Bill of Rights). This equality includes full and equal enjoyment of all rights and freedoms. Towards this goal, legislative and other measures designed to protect or advance persons, or categories of persons disadvantaged by unfair discrimination maybe taken. These may include what has come to be known as "Chapter 9" structures. Specifically the section talks against direct or indirect discrimination on grounds of race, gender, sex, pregnancy HIV/AIDS status, ethnic or social origin, colour, sexual orientation, age, disability, religion, conscience, beliefs, culture, language or birth.

#### MUNICIPAL FINANCE MANAGEMENT ACT NO.56 OF 2003

Although there is no explicit reference in the Act for the designated groups, as part of Supply Chain Management Policy it must include in its sections provisions for Broad Based Black economic empowerment in order to accommodate designated groups.

#### **MUNICIPAL SYSTEMS ACT NO.32 OF 2000**

Chapter 4 section 17 of the Act provides for participation of its communities in encourages the participation of the people with special needs i.e. who cannot read or write, people with disabilities, women and other disadvantaged groups. This includes verbal presentations and rendering conducive environment for participation.

#### NATIONAL YOUTH DEVELOPMENT POLICY FRAMEWORK 2002-2007

Policy seeks to ensure that young people fully participate in the national and community life. In order to ensure a cadre of future leadership it is necessary to create a united, non-racial, non-sexist and prosperous society in which the youth shall promote national reconciliation and unity, build a new patriotism and foster unity.

#### **INTEGRATED NATIONAL DISABILITY STRATEGY 11/08/2008**

The vision of the Integrated National Disability strategy proposed by the white paper is "a society for all". Thus, meaning that there must be an integration of disability issues in all government development strategies, planning and programmes. There must be an integrated co-ordinated management system

for planning, implementation and monitoring at all spheres of government and complementary thereto, there must be capacity building and the process of wide public education.

#### **HIV AND AIDS IN SOUTH AFRICA (2009)**

This is the latest amongst protocol documents on the scourge of this pandemic. It is comprehensive in that while it advocated prevention and treatment, in its influence it also highlights the unsavoury relationships between the abusive men and their partners. It also articulates the devastating effects it has on children and families.

#### NATIONAL POLICY FOR THE OLDER PERSONS (2001)

Older Persons are defined as those individuals who are 60 years old and above. The intention of a policy is to establish a society of the Older Persons who are contented, dignified, possessed of a high sense of self-worth and optimising their potential as well as to ensure that they enjoy all opportunities besides being given the care and protection as members of a family, society and the nation

#### 4. AIMS OF THIS STRATEGY

The broad aims of this strategy include:-

- Meaningful participation in government and civic affairs by designated groups.
- An enabling environment for the marginalised groups to become economically viable and engage in their own upliftment in particular and that of the community in general.
- Reduction of the impact of HIV and AIDS and rate of new infections amongst the youth in the process.
- Dealing with each opportunistic infection that may threaten the existence of the communities.
- Reduction of drug, alcohol and other substances abuse.
- Restoration of cultural pride, and social customs and promotion of indigenous knowledge systems through a human rights based framework
- For the purpose of this strategy the term "designated groups" refers to:
  - "The Older Persons"
  - "Gender issues"
  - "The youth"
  - "The People with Disability" and
  - "The people living with HIV and AIDS"

For this purpose, the Municipality has established a Special Programmes Unit within the Office of the Municipal Manager to drive the envisaged programmes in such a manner that the Municipality takes the lead within the District in the process of mainstreaming.

#### 5. RATIONALE

The Constitution (Act No. 108 of 1996) of the Republic of South Africa advocates for an inclusive society free of unfair discrimination, inequality and abuse. Key to this is the protection and championing the needs of vulnerable groups in society such as the children, youths, persons living with disabilities, women and the Older Persons. In particular, Section 27(1) stipulates that everyone has the right to access:

- a) Health care services, including reproductive health care;
- b) Sufficient food and water;
- c) Social security, including, if they are unable to support themselves and their dependents, appropriate social assistance.

The Constitution under Section 27(2) further state that the state must take reasonable legislative and other measures, within its available resources, to achieve the progressive realisation of each of these rights. Stemming from this constitutional provision a number of legislations were promulgated mandating government to fulfil this constitutional imperative.

It is against this background that Mbhashe Municipality set out to develop a comprehensive strategy to address challenges affecting vulnerable groups and issues of HIV & AIDS within its jurisdiction. In line with the concept of a developmental local government which compels the municipality to be facilitators of development through co-ordinating different role players rather than being a provider of services and facilities, the Municipality sort to involve all role players in the implementation of this strategy.

In the past the needs of the designated groups such as women, children, youth, people with disabilities and those infected and affected with HIV and AIDS were at best neglected and at worst stigmatised, their rights violated and were left to look for themselves in very trying times of oppression and coercion. This strategy, though cross-cutting, will be sector-specific and the programmes will be developed along the lines of cluster approach. We are mindful of the fact that certain activities may be core mandate of other directorates of the Municipality thus, the approach would be based on cooperation.

This approach indicates that the implementation of these programmes is a governance issue and best points to their locations in the Mayor's office. Importantly the strategy will remain a tool through which the Municipality can measure its success in uplifting the status of the designated groups. It will form an integral part of the IDP and the sector plans of the Municipality and its major aims being:

- To build on initiatives to provide all designated groups with meaningful opportunities to unlock their talents and reach their full potential.
- Address major concerns of designated groups and give direction to the work of the Council in relation to special programmes
- It must enable the Council to display a commitment to the National Policy Framework and more specifically the developmental role of local government.
- Sensitise the Council, civil society and other role players towards development of these groups and acknowledge and promote their initiatives.
- At an operational level it must guide the work of administration by providing an enabling environment for these groups to give expression of their needs and interests.
- **6.** Finally, this strategy must lay the foundations for the action plans of each of the groups in a spirit of their central theme and priorities "Nothing about us without us"

#### 7. ALIGNMENT WITH THE EXISTING POLICIES

This strategy has been aligned to the existing policy of Youth which has been developed by the Municipality and guides the participation of this designated group in the affairs of the Municipality. In terms of this policy, their participation and programmes will be guided by the strategy.

#### 8. PROFILE OF MBHASHE LOCAL MUNICIPALITY

Mbhashe Municipality (EC 121) is a category B municipality which falls within the Amathole District Municipality (ADM) and consists of 32 wards and 61 Councillors. The municipality is strategically located in the South Eastern part of the Eastern Cape Province, and is bound by the Qhora River in the south to Mncwasa River in the north along the Indian Ocean.

Mbhashe occupies a strategic geographic position within the Amathole District municipality and covers approximately 3200 km² in extent (after the last national elections). It is estimated that the new additions of few villages from Intsika Yethu and Mnquma could be estimated to about 200 square kilometres of land.

There are three main urban centres, namely Dutywa, Willowvale (Gatyana) and Elliotdale (Xhora). Dutywa is the administrative head centre of the municipality.

Mbhashe has earned the name from the beautiful river called Mbhashe which flows from the banks of Ngcobo flowing through Dutywa, Gatyana (Willowvale) and Xhora (Elliotdale). Mbhashe is comprised of the three towns of Dutywa, Gatyana and Xhora and numerous rural settlements. The area also boasts the head offices of the AmaXhosa Kingdom at Ngadu Great Place.

The Municipality (EC 121) has total population of 254 909 with a household of 60 124 resulting a household size of 4.24 according to the 2011 Stats SA Census. This indicates that Mbhashe has an increase of population and household by 1 537 (1%) and 6 925 (13%) compared to 2001 Stats SA Census resulting a reduction in household size from 4.76 to 4.24. 94% of Mbhashe population is IsiXhosa speaking following by other (3.21%), other than English (1.54%) and Africans (0.52%). Another 0.66% is using sign language (dumb)

An analysis on 2011 Stats SA Census also shows that a bulk of 52% of population is children (age 0-19). About 8% falls in pension group (age 65 +), whilst 40% is at economically active ((age 20-64). This clearly indicates that 60% population is dependent on 40% of youth, which highly demands further consideration of capacity and skill development of the youth population.

Mbhashe owns one of the highest numbers of illiterate populations in the province of the Eastern Cape. 60% of its population is illiterate followed by ordinary schooling (Grade R who attended a formal school; Grade 1-12 learners and learners in special classes) of 37%. Only 0.62% has University degrees. This causes a high pressure to government as well as the population to engage this population in any formal economic activities.

This Municipality is also earmarked as populated with the highest number of poor population in the province of Eastern Cape, which is again revealed by the 2011 Stats SA Census that identifies that the unemployment rate as 93%, resulting from high illiteracy rate. Only 5% of population engaged in the formal sector and at 1% in each of informal and private households and the other number of population engaged in various available sector of employment opportunity in the Mbhashe Municipality.

The study further explains poverty level of Mbhashe. Only 39% of household has monthly income equal to or higher than R 3 000.00, whereas 47% living with equal to or less than R 8 000.00 per month and 14% has no income. It means about 61% households is living within poverty level.

The area has limited employment opportunities and this has huge implications on the increased need for welfare and indigent support in the municipal area. The municipality therefore needs to put priority into service provision, skills and social development especially for the marginalised and designated groups.

#### 9. STATUS QUO OF THE VULNERABLE GROUPS

- Disability activities are performed by the Municipality working with the disabled people. The forum became inactive and came to the end of its term and will be re-established for the next 5year term beginning in July 2017..
- Women's Caucus within the Council was established and the Women's Forum became defunct and has reached end of term and will also be re-established for the next 5year term beginning in July 2017.
- HIV/AIDS: Local AIDS Council has not been established and there is still challenge in as far as
  cooperation between the Municipality and other relevant stakeholders. The municipality's internal
  workplace Policy (management of HIV/AIDS within the Institution) under employee wellness
  program is in place. There are Centres that have been accredited for ARV distribution within the
  jurisdiction of the municipality.
- Mbhashe Older Persons Forum is in place. The Older Persons of Mbhashe are involved in the
  programmes that are sponsored by the Department of Social Development and Special
  Programmes, District Municipality and the Provincial Government and participate in District and
  Provincial structures. Mbhashe Municipality assist in recreational programmes i.e. Golden Games
  (Local, Provincial and Interprovincial) and offer support in centres for older persons around
  Mbhashe.
